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# **Section I:**

### **Overview of the Foundation**



#### Vision and Mission

Mahinder Uberoi saw a world of many facets. He cherished the Dharmic tradition that was his birthright and felt its power as a vehicle for spiritual awakening and fulfillment. Professor Uberoi grasped the breadth of this tradition across the land of its origin and its range of experiences known as Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism, and Sikhism.

The Uberoi Foundation for Religious Studies is Mahinder Uberoi's legacy. After his death in November 2006, a will was read in which he wrote, "I leave all my assets for the scholarly study of Buddhism, Hinduism, Jainism, Sikhism, and other related religions and their music and arts." In order to honor his wishes, the Foundation was established on November 14, 2007, to encourage and support the work of scholars in these Dharmic traditions and to extend the reach of this knowledge in the United States in particular. The Uberoi Foundation for Religious Studies provides a unique opportunity for the scholars of these traditions to explore their common ties in the Dharmic source.

The mission of the Foundation is summarized in these few words: The Uberoi Foundation for Religious Studies serves to raise awareness of the four major Dharmic religions of Buddhism, Hinduism, Jainism, and Sikhism in an effort to promote understanding, communication, tolerance, and peace among the diverse peoples of the world.



### Mahinder Uberoi: The Invisible Benefactor



Mahinder Singh Uberoi was born in Delhi, India shortly after World War I, on March 13, 1924. He ultimately earned a doctorate degree in engineering and lived for most of his adult life in the United States, primarily in Boulder, Colorado. Professor Uberoi passed away in 2006 as a retired academic having chosen to live with very little pretense and ostentation. His wealth, however, was considerable, and his assets today help to raise awareness of Dharmic religions in an effort to promote understanding, communication, tolerance and peace in the world.

#### **Education**

Professor Uberoi grew up in Sialkot, India, and received a bachelors of science degree from Punjab University in 1944. Subsequently, he studied in the United

States, earning a masters degree from the California Institute of Technology in 1946 and a doctorate degree in engineering from the Johns Hopkins University in 1952.

#### **Academic Leadership**

Professor Uberoi began his academic career on the faculty of the Department of Aeronautical Engineering at the University of Michigan from 1953 until 1963. During that period, in 1958, he earned early professional distinction as a John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Fellow at the Royal Institute of Technology in Stockholm.

In 1963, Professor Uberoi moved to Boulder, Colorado, where he lived for more than forty years until his death in 2006. From 1963 to 1975, he served as the chairman of the Department of Aerospace Engineering Sciences at the University of Colorado. Four U.S. astronauts graduated from the Department during those years, including Ellison Onizuka who died with other members of his distinguished crew aboard the space shuttle Challenger in 1986.

As chairman, Professor Uberoi added faculty and advanced basic research in the fields of fluid mechanics, modern control systems, and the biological sciences. Adolf Busemann, the father of supersonic aerodynamics, joined the department in 1963. Much of Professor Uberoi's academic career involved research and teaching far from his adopted city of Boulder, Colorado. In 1966, he was an exchange scientist with the Soviet Academy of Sciences. Between 1972 and 1974, he was an invited professor at the

University of Quebec, followed thereafter in 1974 as a visiting scientist at the Max Plank Institute of Astrophysics in Munich. From 1975 to 1976, Professor Uberoi was an honorary research fellow at Harvard University, and he returned to the University of Colorado between 1981 and 1982 as a Croft professor.

#### **Scientific Achievement**

Professor Uberoi made innumerable contributions to scholarly literature during his career, on topics such as turbulent flow, magneto-hydrodynamics, and combustion. He was the editor of Cosmic Gas Dynamics by Evry Schatzman and Ludwig Bierman. He served on the steering committees associated with the Laboratory for Atmospheric and Space Physics from 1966 to 1969 and with the Cooperative Institute for Research in Environmental Sciences from 1967 to 1969 at the University of Colorado. He organized the all-university Seminar on Environment and Public Policy from 1970 until 1975. He directed and organized a science of flight program of High School Honors Institute from 1968 to 1974, directed the Summer Institute for Disadvantaged High School Students in 1969, and directed and lectured in the Pre-Engineering Program for many years.

#### **Posthumous Orientation**

Mahinder Uberoi passed away on November 25, 2006. He never married and had no children. In 1986, twenty years before his death, he signed his last will and testament. In that document, Professor Uberoi ordered that his assets be used to establish a foundation "for the scholarly study of Buddhism, Hinduism, Jainism, and Sikhism, and other related religions and their music and arts." In implementing his mission, he made it clear that his intent was not to proselytize. "Scholars need not have any particular faith or beliefs," he wrote. To carry out his mission, Professor Uberoi intentionally left much judgment to the men and women who would be named as trustees of the foundation. Nevertheless, by way of example, he wrote, "Obvious candidates for support are persons who are regularly engaged in scholarly work, such as universities, institutes, and religious centers."

Deploying the assets of Professor Uberoi upon his death, the Uberoi Foundation for Religious Studies requested and subsequently received authorization as a tax-exempt private foundation by the U.S. Internal Revenue Service on December 13, 2007. The five founding trustees of the Foundation wish to express particular gratitude to a former student of Professor Uberoi, Mr. Randy Nishiyama, for his tireless and selfless work in helping to lay the groundwork for the Foundation. Along with founding trustee, Parveen Setia, Mr. Nishiyama provided a most thoughtful and invaluable service in memory of the man who was once his educator.



#### **Board of Trustees**



Professor Ved P. Nanda Chair, Board of Trustees

Professor Ved P. Nanda is John Evans University Professor and Thompson G. Marsh Professor of Law at the Sturm College of Law, University of Denver and serves as Director of the International Legal Studies Program there. In 2006 Professor Nanda was honored with the founding of the Nanda Center for International Law. He was also Vice Provost at the University of Denver from 1994-2008, and since 2007 he has served as a member of the Board of Trustees of

the Iliff School of Theology, Denver. He holds or has held numerous official posts in international, regional, and national professional and civil society organizations.

Among numerous national and international awards, he has received the World Jurist Association's Highest Order of Justice and its World Legal Scholar Award, the Gandhi-King-Ikeda Award for Peace-Building from Soka Gakkai International and Morehouse College, the Human Rights Award from the United Nations Association, and Civil Rights Award from B'nai B'rith. He has received honorary doctorates from Soka University in Tokyo, Japan and from Bundelkhand University, Jhansi, India. He is widely published, having authored or co-authored 23 books in various fields of international law and over 180 chapters and major law review articles. He is a frequent guest on television and radio and writes regularly on international issues for the *Denver Post*.



Mr. Parveen Setia Vice-Chair, Board of Trustees

Parveen Setia, Vice-Chair, has been a US citizen since 1987. He is married to Minaxi Setia, sister-in-law of Anu Bhatia, and has three children, all in college. Mr. Setia graduated from Massachusetts College of Pharmacy and earned his MBA from Webster University, 2008. He is employed as Pharmacist Team Leader at the Lakeland Medical Center in Lakeland, Florida. He is actively involved in the Ekal Vidalya project to support education of children in Indian villages.



Mrs. Anu Bhatia Trustee

Anu Bhatia, eldest of the three nieces of Mahinder Singh Uberoi, lives in Delhi with her husband. They have two daughters. She graduated from the St. Ann's Convent in Hyderabad in 1979 and obtained a diploma in Textile Designing with Distinction in 1983 and went to work for four years in a textile printing house. After she married in 1984 she has managed the family textile business. Mrs. Bhatia also takes a keen interest in social activities such as raising funds for under-privileged children and has taken part in discussions regarding social issues on national

television. Regarding her uncle's legacy, Mrs. Bhatia says, "Living thousands of miles away, the most difficult task was finding people in U.S.A. who would take interest in fulfilling our Uncle's wishes. God has been kind and we are very fortunate to have such good friends to work with. As work progresses on the Uberoi Foundation we sincerely hope as trustees that by carefully choosing the plan of action we wish to act upon, we are able to achieve the vision of our late uncle."



Mrs. Jyothi Bhatia Trustee

Jyothi Bhatia lives with her husband and two daughters in Noida, on the outskirts of New Delhi. She graduated from St. Ann's High School in 1980 and completed her diploma of two years in Fashion Designing in 1982. She then worked with Parisbased garment house "Jack and Jack" for five years. She travelled extensively all over the country and to Nepal between 1982 and 1987. She has her own fashion design studio and the couple has been successfully running their own business for the last 10 years. Mrs. Bhatia and her husband were married in 1988. He is a real

estate consultant in Delhi. They have two daughters, Sahiba and Vrinda. correspondence with foreign buyers, especially in the UK, Germany, and Italy. The couple has two children. About the Uberoi Foundation, Sneha says, "Our uncle has left us a purpose to fulfill which we hope to achieve with the help of our dear friends who head our foundation. We would like to put in our best efforts and move towards the goal of our foundation."



#### **Executive Staff**



Mr. James T. Polsfut Executive Director and Treasurer

Jim Polsfut has served as the executive director of the Uberoi Foundation for Religious Studies since its inception, as well as its treasurer since 2011. In addition, he serves as chair of the advisory board of the University of Denver Josef Korbel School of International Studies (the Social Science Foundation) and as a member of the boards of the U.S.-Mexico Foundation and the IPODERAC Orphanage in Puebla, Mexico.

Professionally, Mr. Polsfut has focused on financial services and Latin America throughout his career. Currently, he serves as the CEO and Chairman of the Board of the North American Specialty Hospital. Previously, he helped to create a private bank and trust company called First Western Trust Bank, based in Denver. In that capacity, he served as president of First Western Development Corporation, a division of the bank responsible for corporate acquisitions. ### **Grant Awards in 2019**

#### **A Summary**

The Uberoi Foundation for Religious Studies serves to raise awareness of the four major Dharmic religions of Buddhism, Hinduism, Jainism, and Sikhism, in an effort to promote understanding, communication, tolerance, and peace among the diverse peoples of the world. The Foundation's primary source of grant-making revenue is investment proceeds from the perpetual endowment created by the estate of the late Professor Mahinder Singh Uberoi.

# Grant Awards in 2019

#### 1. CSU Fresno Foundation

**Project:** Gandhi's Global Legacy: In India and Beyond

**Applicant/Lead:** Veena Howard

<u>Project Plan</u>: This four-part project is built to culminate in Mahatma Gandhi's 150<sup>th</sup> birth anniversary international conference at Fresno State in Fall 2019. Over the course of two years, this project will comprehensively analyze M.K. Gandhi's global legacy of nonviolence by 1) teaching study groups focusing on Gandhi's legacy 2) holding lectures 3) organizing an international conference for Gandhi's 150<sup>th</sup> birthday anniversary 4) producing a post-conference edited volume. The study groups will educate students on Gandhi's teachings, which will in turn make them informed and engaged participants in the lectures and conference, the fundamental basis for the edited volume. The particular design of this project will help students, activists, and scholars to consider solutions to issues of social justice, peace, economic, equality, and sustainability.

A student-focused project on Gandhi is conducive to promoting nonviolent problem-solving and creating framework to understand the relevance of Gandhi's philosophy in the face of 21<sup>st</sup> century issues. Gandhi's teachings have influenced numerous leaders and movements across the globe—from Martin Luther King, Jr. and Caesar Chavez to Vandana Shiva and Gayatri Parivar. The international conference and edited volume will emphasize the fact that Gandhi incorporated many teachings and principles of Dharma traditions, including Hindu, Jain, Buddhist, and Sikh religious traditions into his life and methods. He made the Hindu, Jain, and Buddhist ethical principle of *ahimsa* central to his strategy of activism and he often emphasized the power of this virtue. In his rendering of the method of satyagraha he drew upon the Hindu (also Sikh) concept of Sat (Truth and Reality). Education and analysis regarding the religious roots of Gandhi's practices will prompt a thorough understanding of how Gandhi created strategies for social change.

#### 2. Loyola Marymount University

**Project:** Clinical Professor of Yoga and Health

Applicant/Lead: Chris Chapple

<u>Project Plan</u>: This grant will support and enhance the teaching of health sciences as informed by the Dharma traditions of India: Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism, and Sikhism. The project includes community outreach and university instruction leading to certificates and degrees. The activities supported by the grant will contribute to the teaching of the

four-year Yoga Therapy Rx program offered by LMU's Center for Religion and Spirituality; the Master of Arts in Yoga Studies; and the Post-Graduate Certificate in Yoga Therapy.

The work of this grant will build on prior jointly funded activities in the area of health sciences. In October 2017, LMU Yoga Studies presented a two-day conference with support from the Uberoi Foundation, the Doshi Bridgebuilder fund, and individual donors: Ayurveda: Health for Body and Mind. This event showcased the longstanding work at LMU in the area of Indian approaches to health science. The conference continues to be available on the LMU Yoga Studies You Tube Channel. Representatives from all four Dharma traditions presented their research on how yogic lifestyle can help enhance overall health and wellness. For the purposes of continuing and expanding this good work, LMU Yoga Studies seeks to establish a funded three-year Clinical Professorship of Yoga Studies, simultaneously seeking funds for an endowment to ensure that this work continues into the fourth year and beyond.

The Clinical Professor will effectively manage the operations of yogic wellness activities at LMU and beyond including classroom instruction and supervised internships. This programming will meet the goals of advancing knowledge and application of human health through the lens of Dharma traditions. Specifically, this individual will be responsible for the teaching of ongoing courses including Yoga and Health Science and the LMU Extension study of Yoga Therapy in India as well as the development of new courses including Yoga and Health Science II, Yoga Therapy Applications, and Yoga Therapy Practicum.

This new position will allow for the development of continuing and new clinic opportunities that will grant LMU students much-needed internship opportunities. These emerging clinics target a range of populations, from private paid clients to underserved patients for whom free care is provided. Existing programs include the Venice Family Clinic, the Braille Institute, and offerings to Doshi clients at El Segundo Public Library. New programs will include serving the inner-city Hispanic community through the USC Wellness Center; support classes for persons with cancer, Parkinson's disease, and other maladies; the Jewish Home for the Aged in Playa Vista; Fountainview Westside Senior Community; Culver City Community Center, and other locations. Additionally, clinical research into the effect of Yoga practice on the LMU undergraduate population will continue, building on data gathered for the past several years as part of a class taught in multiple sections each semester. LMU Yoga Studies continues to train Yoga teachers for LMU's Family of Schools through which Yoga wellness instruction is provided to 2,500 K-12 students weekly.

#### 3. Loyola Marymount University

**Project:** Uberoi Foundation Scholarship in Dharmic Studies

**Applicant/Lead:** Chris Chapple

<u>Project Plan</u>: The Uberoi Foundation Scholarship in Dharma Studies will support two Master of Arts in Yoga Studies candidates as they pursue completion of their degrees. This continuing support will ensure the development of qualified Yoga instructors and

practitioners and further literacy in the Dharmic traditions, contributing to the overall Yoga Studies program at Loyola Marymount University.

The primary goal of the scholarship support will be to support students who are studying the four major Dharmic religions of Buddhism, Hinduism, and Sikhism, thereby raising awareness of these traditions. With this support, students will become future teachers and practitioners of Yoga and Dharmic traditions with the ultimate goal of promoting understanding, communication, tolerance, and peace among the diverse peoples of the world.

#### 4. Loyola Marymount University

Project: ISSJS Teaching for Peace Institute

**Applicant/Lead:** Chris Chapple

<u>Project Plan</u>: Funding will support Teaching for Peace, a three-week seminar in India for K-12 teachers conducted by the International Summer School for Jain Studies and support of a K-12 teacher to be a guest teacher at the Vallabh Smarak Bhogilal School in North Delhi or at Hira Lal Jain Senior Secondary School in Old Delhi for three months.

The three-week experience, designed for K-12 teachers from North America, will provide skills drawing from the religions of India to integrate practical nonviolence into the classroom. Intensive course work entails morning lectures, afternoon discussions, field trips to institutions such as schools and businesses practicing nonviolence, interactions with people who live a nonviolent lifestyle, as well as conversations with scholars. Participants will learn the basics of ahimsa through the study of historical figures and living examples. Applications of ahimsa will be discussed with regard to interpersonal relations, business practices, and the environment. Participants will learn how to model and teach nonviolence behavior in the classroom.

The seminar will take place in Delhi, Jaipur, Jalgaon, and Pune from July 9 to 30, 2019. Lectures by expert practitioners and scholars will be given each morning, with group discussion and presentation scheduled for the afternoon. Visits will be made to Jain Bharati Mrigavati Vidyalaya, a K-12 on the campus of Vallabh Smarak in Alipur, North Delhi; the Hira Lal Jain School, an upper school in Old Delhi; the Gandhi Museum; the Taj Mahal; the Anubhuti Schools; and Wagholi, a rehabilitation center for adult learners. Expert faculty will include Drs. Shugan Jain, Atul Shah, Benjamin Zenk, Viney Jain, and others. Logistical support will be provided by Rachael Hammerlein and Namita Jain, educators who have worked with young children (Rachael) and high school students (Namita).

The three-month residency program will enable a teacher from North America to contribute to the learning of children informed by values of nonviolence and religious pluralism. The schools that participate in this program serve middle class and underprivileged children through a comprehensive curriculum.

#### 5. Buena Vista University

**Project:** Uberoi Teacher Training -- Iowa

**Applicant:** Swasti Bhattacharyya

<u>Project Plan</u>: During the training program, educators from around northwest lowa will have the opportunity to learn about the four primary Dharma traditions of India: Buddhism, Hinduism, Jainism, and Sikhism. Along with introducing these four traditions, pedagogical strategies to best teach this material, on a variety of levels, will be presented and discussed. Finally, these classes will provide a background for participants in the Iowa program to apply for the 2020 residential UTTI summer experience in India.

The five-day/ten-session experience will familiarize participants with the core teachings and practices of traditions within Buddhism, Hinduism, Jainism, and Sikhism. Along with introducing these religious traditions, participants will also focus on the best pedagogical strategies that will enable them to utilize the content in their various settings. The training will take place on the campus of Buena Vista University in Storm Lake, Iowa. Following an application process, 10 participants will be invited to the campus for the study of the four Dharma traditions. Participants will commit to meeting one Saturday a month for five months: Sat 14 Sept 2019, Sat 12 Oct 2019, Sat 16 Nov 2019, Sat 7 March 2020, and Sat 18 Apr 2020. The sessions will include instruction by Dr. Bhattacharyya as primary professor, cultural events (food, music, dance), visit to the Hindu temple in Madrid, IA and, where possible, guest lectures. One day will be devoted to each tradition, and the best pedagogical strategies, with the final day a time for summation, presentations, and reflection.

The textbook for the course will be the Uberoi-supported volume *Dharma: The Hindu, Jain, Buddhist and Sikh Traditions of India* published by I.B. Tauris and edited by Uberoi grantee Professor Veena Howard of Cal State Fresno.

#### 6. Institute of Advanced Sciences

**Project:** Nationwide Teacher Training in Dharmic Traditions

Applicant/Lead: Bal Ram Singh

<u>Project Plan</u>: The proposal is to expand the current Uberoi Foundation Fellowship program for teachers into a national initiative with multiple regional centers to reach teachers who teach India-related courses in middle and high schools of the United States. In 2019, the program is proposed to run through a national center in Massachusetts as well as five or six regional centers throughout the country. These regional centers will work on curriculum and programming with a central coordinator and consultants and engage local and national volunteers, speakers, and participants, as usual.

The Institute has solicited leadership applications for the regional centers from teachers who have participated in the Uberoi teacher training program, or others who have demonstrated equivalent experience or expertise. Professor Bal Ram Singh has led the UFF and Uberoi Teacher Training India (UTTI) pilot program for the past nine years, and he is now directing the program's expansion. The planned regional workshops will constitute centralized lectures on a fixed curriculum, with individual activities and engagements facilitated in local areas. The program is expected to run in collaboration

with school districts, which can share the cost of local expenses as successfully run in Denver for the past four years. Eventually, the hope is to run Uberoi workshops in all fifty states.

#### 7. True Dharma International

**Project:** "Good Death, Auspicious Rebirth" Training

**Applicant:** Frank Tedesco

<u>Project Plan</u>: Funds from the Uberoi Foundation will be used to create end-of-life Dharma training modules for teaching in medical and nursing schools, hospitals and hospices. Modules will be inclusive of the four Dharma traditions of Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism and Sikhism, and other worldviews found in India and among overseas Indians. The multimedia curriculum will include filming interviews with dying patients, their family members and attending medical personnel with a focus on discussion for advance care planning, living wills, and spiritual preparation for a happy or "good death" and confidence in an "auspicious rebirth".

#### 8. Hindu American Foundation

**Project:** Getting Hinduism Right: Empowering Educators through

Professional Development

**Applicant:** Suhag Shukla

<u>Project Plan</u>: Since August 2013, HAF has offered Hinduism 101 professional development opportunities nationwide, and trained over 3,150 teachers. Resources provided through the program have enabled curriculum supervisors and educators to enhance content and assessment materials related to Hinduism. Furthermore, this initiative has helped to forge long-lasting partnerships with other organizations, including universities, social studies councils, and history education groups. This effort has enabled educators around the country to improve their accuracy and cultural proficiency when teaching about Hinduism.

In order to meet growing demands for both content and teacher trainings, HAF seeks to continue its partnership with Uberoi to further scale this successful initiative. With these funds, HAF will enhance its professional development efforts to better meet the needs of K-12 teachers in the United States. There are three ways in which HAF proposes to triangulate its education efforts to ensure accurate and concise instruction on Hinduism. These three items are concurrent and interrelated:

- 1. Create extended lesson plans and interactive thematic units
- 2. Hold teacher centered focus groups and brainstorming sessions
- 3. Expand professional development services and offerings to include cultural proficiency

#### 9. University of Michigan

**Project:** Indic Contemplative Traditions in College Classrooms

**Applicant/Lead:** Arvind Mandair

<u>Project Plan</u>: This project focuses on a workshop designed to create pedagogical resources for engaging "contemplative practices" based in Indian spiritual traditions as a

form of experiential learning in the university classroom. One of the most difficult pedagogical problems facing the study of Indian traditions in academia lies in accounting for the place of "contemplative practices," an ever-evolving category of activities including meditation, yoga and mindfulness largely derived but in many ways now distinct from their source traditions. Within the context of the history of Indian religions, meditation, yoga and similar practices can be taught and researched as just one of many tools developed in the study of Hinduism, Sikhism, Jainism, and Buddhism to a variety of spiritual ends, conducted in almost innumerable varieties across time and tradition. They can as well be taught as philosophical and spiritual innovations ever evolving in the global religious landscape, open to active interpretation and dialogue with other religious traditions, and presenting a new opportunity to engage the commonalities between Indian traditions as they have evolved in a new cultural and spiritual landscape in the West.

The project is designed to engage directly the question of what potentials and risks exist when bringing these practices into the university classroom. In addition, it seeks to engage the widespread interest and production of research by neuroscience, clinical psychology, psychiatry and other scientific disciplines around these cultures in the religious studies classroom in order to bring the sometimes divergent perspectives of natural scientific and humanities on mind and consciousness into productive conversation.

The goal of the workshop is two-fold. First, to collaborate on a scholarly publication outlining the future research necessary to continue a rigorous and systematic conversation on the future of pedagogies of Indian religions. Second, to begin creating a guidebook of pedagogical resources for integrating contemplative practices into the Indian religious studies classroom as a form of experiential learning. The goal of the handbook will be to create an institutionally legible definition of contemplative practices, contextualize their development and arrival in the university setting, create guidelines, and collect resources for navigating several ethical concerns that have arisen based on existing models for their inclusion in the university classroom. Another major goal will be to create ways to integrate interdisciplinary engagement to frame the conversations around "neuro-culture," that is, Western scientific studies of the mind that have deeply engaged the relevance and effectiveness of Indian spiritual and contemplative practices, in new terms in the college classroom. These resources will include sample syllabi and activities, as well as suggestions for integration into lessons, guidelines for concerns about mental health, issues of identify, and legal concerns in the classroom.

#### 10. Hindupedia

**Project:** Hindupedia's Textbook Reform

**Applicant/Lead:** Krishna Maheshwari

<u>Project Plan</u>: This project is to drive reform of textbooks as they cover Dharmic traditions in ancient and medieval India. Fifty-four citations from Hindupedia's review of Houghton Mifflin Harcourt (HMH) were used by the California State Board of Education in their banning of HMH from California from selling History Social Science Materials for

grades K-8 until 2028 resulting in a 14% drop in their stock price and thus giving Hindupedia an unprecedented opening.

At this stage, Hindupedia's focus is on the textbooks used outside of California for these materials (grade varies by state but generally the topic is covered once anytime between grades 6-10). Professor Kundan Singh (of Sophia University) has been engaged on a full-time basis as a Sr. Fellow in support of this effort.

#### 11. California State University Fresno Foundation

**Project:** Uberoi Teacher Training -- Fresno

**Applicant:** Veena Howard

<u>Project Plan</u>: During a ten-session training program, teachers and professors will learn about the four primary Dharma traditions of India: Hinduism, Jainism, Buddhism, and Sikhism. The course will provide preparation for these teachers and professors to apply for the 2020 residential experience in India.

Collectively, the sessions will familiarize participants with the core teachings and practices of Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism, and Sikhism on the campus of California State University, Fresno. Professor Howard is currently working with the Kremen School of Education at CSU Fresno to determine which one of the following models will work well. The Dean of Liberal Studies offered his support and suggested considering the course as an elective course with 2 units. ONE: During a week during the summer of 2019, Fresno campus students as well as teachers will participate in a five day study of the four Dharma traditions. This will include instruction by myself as primary professor, guest lectures, cultural events (food, music, dance), and, where possible, home and temple visits. One day will be devoted to each tradition, with the final day a time for summation and reflection. MODEL TWO: Registered students will take the course to one Saturday a month over the course of five months (Sept, Oct, Nov, Jan, Feb) for the study of the four Dharma traditions. This will include instruction by myself as primary professor, guest lectures, cultural events (food, music, dance), and, where possible, home and temple visits. One day will be devoted to each tradition, with the final day a time for summation and reflection.

The textbook for the course will be the Uberoi-supported volume on Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism, and Sikhism published by I.B. Tauris.

#### 12. University of Colorado Foundation

**Project:** Trungpa Lecture in Buddhist Studies

**Applicant/Lead:** Holly Gayley

<u>Project Plan</u>: The Department of Religious Studies at CU Boulder is in its fifth year of collaborating with Naropa University on an annual lecture series in Buddhist Studies, named after Chögyam Trungpa Rinpoche, the founder of Naropa who first came to Boulder in 1971 at the invitation of CU professors. Free and open to the public, the annual Trungpa Lecture enhances the academic study of Buddhism in Colorado and contributes to public understandings about Dharmic Traditions along Colorado's Front Range. With the help of the Uberoi Foundation and private Naropa donors, four eminent scholars have

appeared for the Trungpa Lecture: Janet Gyatso (Harvard University) in 2013, John Makransky (Boston College) in 2014, José Cabezón (University of California Santa Barbara) in 2015, and David Germano (University of Virginia) in 2016. The lecture is held in alternating years at CU and Naropa with a luncheon colloquium for graduate students from both institutions with the guest speaker. This year, at CU Boulder, Charles Ramble (Oxford University) will to speak about Sacred Landscape in Himalaya, a topic which will include Buddhist interactions with Bön and Hindu sites and rituals.

#### 13. Institute of Advanced Sciences

**Project:** Teacher Training in Dharmic Traditions

**Applicant/Lead:** Bal Ram Singh

#### 14. Hindu University of America

**Project:** Denver Teacher Training Program

Applicant/Lead: Indira Walia

<u>Project Plan:</u> 2017 marks the fourth year of what was in its 2014 inaugural year a very successful teacher training program in all four Dharmic Traditions for middle school and high school teachers within the area of Denver, Colorado. Once again, in 2017, a class of local teachers will participate in a four-day introduction to the Dharmic traditions. Leading the training program is Indira Walia, originally from Himatchal Pradesh, India, prior to residency in America for now more than 30 years. Mrs. Walia has more than a decade of experience as a middle school teacher, and outside of the classroom, she is a private teacher of the Hindi language, an adjunct faculty member at the University of Denver, and a former president of the India Association of Colorado.

#### 15. California State University Fresno Foundation

**Project:** Women, Goddesses, Yogis, and Others

Applicant/Lead: Veena Rani Howard

Project Plan: Veena Howard is the editor of a book whose working title is *Women, Goddesses, Yogis, and Others: Gendering in Indian Philosophy.* The edited volume, under contract, is to be published by Bloomsbury Publishing, U.K. This book is a comprehensive collection of novel, theoretically-informed essays by a group of internationally esteemed scholars investigating various dimensions and conceptualization of gender (goddesses, yogis, women, and others) in a broad variety of Indian philosophical texts and traditions—Hindu, Jain, Buddhist, and Sikh—ranging from ancient to modern eras. This book highlights roles and representations of women and various gender issues in Indian philosophical texts and traditions. It underscores rich debates on these issues in each traditions' texts, and it has the potential to serve as a tool to remove gender biases as have been portrayed in the media.

As the most comprehensive and first volume of this nature, this collection will include theoretically-informed essays investigating issues in gender through various interdisciplinary approaches. Written by a variety of esteemed scholars, the collection will provide a dialectical examination of complex gender constructions as well as theoretical frameworks in relation to contemporary debates on women's roles, gender discourse in theology, ecology and the feminine, as well as their implication on the practiced religion. This collection aims to theoretically and creatively engage with conceptualizations of gender in Indian texts and traditions while also highlighting culturally unique attitudes toward gender as illustrated through the models of goddesses/gods, yogis/yogins, women/men, and others in Indian philosophical literature (Hindu, Jain, Buddhist, and Sikh).

#### 16. Loyola Marymount University

**Project:** Uberoi Teacher Training in India (UTTI) Program

**Applicant/Lead:** Chris Chapple

<u>Project Plan</u>: For many years, the Uberoi Foundation has provided grant-making in support of teacher training for middle school and high school teachers, beginning in 2010 at the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth under the direction of Dr. Bal Ram Singh, thereafter expanding elsewhere such as into Denver in 2014. The trustees of the Uberoi Foundation introduced in 2016 a training program for certain teachers and school administrators on-site in India, led by Dr. Bal Ram Singh. The second undertaking of the Uberoi Teacher Training in India (UTTI) program will take place in the summer of 2018, led on this occasion by Dr. Chris Chapple.

### Historic Sessions of the Annual Experts Meeting

Beginning in its first year of operation in 2008, the Uberoi Foundation for Religious Studies has placed a high priority on gathering together experts from the four Dharmic traditions – in one city and in one room, in order to share, collaborate, brainstorm, and engage. A brief recap of the Experts Meetings held since the Foundation's inception appears below.

**2008:** During its first year of operation, in October of 2008, the Uberoi Foundation hosted in Denver, Colorado, more than a dozen renowned scholars of Dharmic traditions. The scholars used their time together to sketch out the contours of the Foundation's work. Representatives of Hinduism, Buddhism, and Jainism were on hand in person, and a representative of Sikhism was present by conference call. Remarkably, the scholars noted how unusual it was for them to be together to reflect on the common threads that bind these Dharmic traditions and that, as scholars, they rarely, if ever, have that opportunity. It was a wonderful and meaningful beginning to the work that the Foundation had launched.

**2009:** Over two days in late October of 2009, the Foundation organized a second opportunity to meet with scholars. To participate in its Uberoi Foundation Experts Meeting, on location in Orlando, Florida, the Foundation invited twenty academicians to collaborate with its five-member board of trustees in three joint sessions. In the months leading up to the sessions, the Foundation announced its intention at the Experts Meeting to delve deeply into the commonalities of the four Indic Dharmic traditions as well as

into the ways in which those traditions contribute to society. For the Experts Meeting, Shiva Bajpai prepared a paper on *Theism: The Ultimate Reality* and Arvind-Pal Mandair and Bal Ram Singh prepared a paper on *Karma*.

**2010:** The Foundation's Experts gathered in Denver in October of 2010 at the Iliff School of Theology. Over two full days of fast-paced discourse, the Experts revealed their considerable talents and scope. In so doing, they demonstrated a high level of academic rigor in their presentations and conversations. Deliberations at the Experts

Meeting among the scholars very successfully met the lofty charge set by the organizer, Dr. Arvind Sharma, who selected the topic of *Decolonizing Indic Studies*.

**2011:** In the beginning of October in 2011, the Foundation's Experts had the pleasure of meeting over two days in Los Angeles, California, with the significant assistance of co-sponsors Loyola Marymount University and Nalanda International. The 2011 Uberoi Foundation Experts Meeting, entitled *In Our Own Voices: Dharma Education in North America*, sought to facilitate the emergence of innovative and creative theories, approaches, and methods to education and scholarship in Hindu, Jain, Buddhist and Sikh Dharma traditions. "In Our Own Voices" drew attention to the fact that Dharma traditions are not at the center of the dominant global discourse on contemporary issues and challenges. The voices (wisdom and discernment) of the Dharma traditions are currently on the margins. Yet they are of great significance and relevance to the crises that face humanity. The on-going goal is to position the insights of Dharma as integral to addressing these challenges. The term "In Our Own Voices" does not refer to who is talking or

writing but rather refers to which lens is being used to define and understand the Dharma traditions.

*2012:* In mid-October of 2012, the Experts of the Uberoi Foundation for Religious Studies once again had the opportunity to meet together over a period of two Gathering days. Denver, Colorado, the Experts began with reflections on the tragic attack brought upon the Sikh Gurdwara Wisconsin

earlier that year. The Experts then turned their attention to practical, in-depth discussions on the two programmatic priorities of the Uberoi Foundation – namely, training U.S. school teachers in Dharmic traditions and correcting distortions and inadequacies of Dharmic traditions in North American textbooks. The Experts concluded their time together by sharing brief presentations of pivotal work underway on each of these two programmatic priorities by likeminded organizations and experts.

*2013:* In the summer of 2013, the vitality of one of the Uberoi Foundation's primary grant-making programs served as the centerpiece of the Foundation's annual Experts Meeting. Assembling in Dartmouth, Massachusetts, the trustees gathered together a smaller, core group of Experts for reflection on the Foundation's strategy and participation in the annual teacher training program held at the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth. Twenty Experts began their time together on July 31 with a minisymposium in recognition of the 150th birthday anniversary of Swami Vivekananda and, specifically, on the impact of his travels to the western world in 1893. The mini-symposium's discussion included the participation of Uberoi Foundation chair Ved Nanda and Uberoi trustees Yashwant Pathak, Shiva Bajpai, and Bal Ram Singh. Witnessing the detail of the training provided to the teachers, the trustees took part mid-week in a focus placed on Jain beliefs, lifestyle, and culture, as well as an evening dance demonstration by UMass Dartmouth student Anuradha Tata. In a strategy session held in the afternoon of August 1, the Uberoi trustees brainstormed on how best to implement the intended mission of Professor Mahinder Uberoi, especially with regard to the Foundation's two fundamental priorities for the next several years – the training of U.S. teachers in the Dharmic traditions and the correcting of distortions about the Dharmic traditions in U.S. textbooks.

**2014:** As Fall colors descended upon the valley of Boulder, Colorado, the Uberoi Foundation gathered in mid-September on the historic campus of Naropa University. The Foundation's annual Expert Meeting began with a special Friday evening event organized by the University of Colorado and Naropa University called the *Chogyam Trungpa Lecture*, sponsored by Uberoi. Dr. John Makransky, professor of Buddhism at Boston University, served passionately and inspirationally as the keynote speaker. On the Saturday and Sunday which followed, the Foundation then focused exclusively on its theme for the Experts Meeting in 2014 – *Compassion in the Four Dharmic Traditions*. A total of 21 speakers participated in the featured sessions, along with keynote speeches offered during meal times. Following the Experts Meeting, the Uberoi Foundation assembled and edited the papers delivered over the weekend into a book for subsequent publishing and dissemination.

**2015:** In the beginning of October of 2015, the Uberoi Foundation gathered once again for its annual Experts Meeting, this time in Tampa, Florida, on the campus of the University of South Florida. The Jijnyasa Foundation co-sponsored the meeting, represented by its executive director, Dr. Gururaj Mutalik,

among others from its network. Uberoi Foundation Advisory Committee Chairman Dr. Yashwant Pathak was a most gracious host, as were Uberoi Vice Chairman Shri Parveen Setia and his wife, Smt. Mini Setia, who reside in southern Florida. Dharma Education in the United States – Challenges and Opportunities served as the focus of the 2015 Experts Meeting, with many first-time participants taking part, and in so

doing, adding tremendous value. Those individuals included Dr. Vishwa Adluri from Hunter College in New York; Dr. Narinjan Kaur Khalsa from Loyola Marymount University; Dr. A.S. Pandya at Florida Atlantic University; Prof. Andrew Schelling from Naropa University; Mr. Matthew Spurlin, a PhD student at the University of Denver; Dr. Darshan Thakkar from Boston; Dr. Lavanya Vemsani from Shawnee State University; and Dr. Alice Wood from Bethune-Cookman University.

**2016:** On September 15, the Uberoi Foundation assembled in Montreal for its annual Expert Meeting in order to attend a special program of an Uberoi grantee, McGill University. Professor Arvind Sharma, faculty member of Religious Studies at McGill and a regular expert of the Uberoi Foundation, served as the lead organizer of the Third Global Conference on World's Religions since September 11: From Faith to Interfaith. Co-sponsored by the Uberoi Foundation, the Conference called upon many prominent keynote speakers, including Deepak Chopra and Sri Sri Ravi Shankar. Following the Conference, members of the Uberoi Advisory Committee and of the Uberoi Grants Committee met in strategic planning sessions in order to review the programmatic priorities of the Uberoi Foundation and the implementation of those priorities through the Foundation's grantmaking process. A renewed commitment resulted with regard to the Foundation's focus on teacher training and textbook reform.

**2017:** Between September 29 and October 1, the Uberoi Foundation met in Denver in association with the Ved Nanda Center and the Sturm College of Law at the University of Denver to focus on *The Environment, Climate Change, and Sustainability from the Perspectives of the Four Dharmic Traditions.* Professors Rita Sherma, Veena Howard, Ramdas Lamb, Mugdha Yeolekar, Bal Ram Singh, Lavanya

Vemsani, Subhash Kak, Haragopal Parsa, and Appachanda Thimmaiah provided the Hindu perspective; Professors Claude D'Estree, Joan Policastri, and Matt Spurlin the Buddhist perspective; Professor Nirinjan Kaur Khlas and Mr. Dilpreet Singh Jammu the Sikh perspective; and Professor Chris Chapple, Dr. Sulekh Jain, and Professor Yashwant Malaiya the Jain perspective. A most interesting dimension of the 2017 Experts Meeting was the offering of a perspective on the topic from the U.S. indigenous tradition, led by Lakota elder Grandmother Regina Brave, Lakota leader Doug Good Feather, Professor Andrew Reid, and Professor Yashwant Pathak.

**2018:** In Mid-October, the Uberoi Foundation met once again in Tampa, Florida, and on this occasion at the Patel College of Global Sustainability on the campus of the University of South Florida. Yashwant Pathak served as the chair and the host of the 2018 Annual Experts Meeting and the inauguration of a second decade of Experts Meetings, with this now as the eleventh in a series. Over a day and a half, a total of nine sessions took place on the topic of *Human Rights and Human Dignity: Rooted in the Four Dharmic Traditions*, a theme developed thoroughly through the presentation of 28 separate abstracts.

**2019:** From October 11 through 13, the Uberoi Foundation met in its annual Experts Meeting, once again held in Denver. This year, the theme was *Health and Well-Being in the Four Dharmic Traditions*. Its focus was simple – namely, what do the Dharmic traditions reveal about how each person might live to his or her full potential? Wisdom was shared by accomplished and talented speakers from all over the country – from Florida to Hawaii and from Boston to Los Angeles.

# THE EXPERTS

#### **Shereen Bhalla**



Shereen Bhalla is the Hindu America Foundation (HAF's) Director of Education based in Washington, DC. Dr. Bhalla holds a B.A. in Journalism and Mass Communication from Drake University, an M.A. in International Relations from St. Mary's University, and a PhD in Culture, Literacy, and Language from the University of Texas at San Antonio (UTSA). Prior to joining HAF, she was the Online Manager and Research Associate for the Center for Applied Linguistics. An advocate for culturally and linguistically

diverse students, Dr. Bhalla has over ten years of experience teaching both English learners as well as pre-and in-service educators on how to best meet the needs of their students. Dr. Bhalla has taught for UTSA, George Washington University, the Inter-Development Bank and Johns Hopkins University.

#### **David Burton**


## **Alok Kumar**

Salem and Alok Kumar, 1991 and 1996; (2) Sciences of the Ancient Hindus: Unlocking Nature in the Pursuit of Salvation, 2014; (3) A History of Science in World Cultures: Voices of Knowledge, Scott Montgomery and Alok Kumar, 2015; and (4)

Ancient Hindu Science: Its Transmission and Impact on World Cultures, 2019. He is a fellow of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation, Germany and a NOVA/NASA fellow. He is active in the fields of atomic physics, chemical physics, history of science, and science education.

## Ramdas Lamb



Ramdas Lamb is an Associate Professor of Religion at the University of Hawai'i, where he has been teaching for more than two decades with a specific emphasis on teaching about the Dharma traditions in America. From 1969 until 1978, he was a Hindu sadhu in the Ramananda Sampraday India, during which time he began his study and practice of traditional methods sadhana, including ashtanga yoga. #### **Darryl Macer**



Darryl Macer is President of American University of Sovereign Nations (AUSN, www.ausn.info), and Professor of Bioethics and Biomedicine at AUSN, where he also serves as Provost. He served from 2004 until 2013 as UNESCO Regional Adviser for Social and Human Sciences in Asia and the Pacific. He is credited with over three hundred academic publications (45 books; 230 Peer Reviewed papers in academic journals and books; and other academic publications in academic journals). Dr. Macer taught undergraduate and graduate students as a Foreign Professor at the University of Tsukuba, Tsukuba

Science City from 1990-2005. He also serves as Affiliated Professor, Department of Philosophy, University of Kumamoto, Japan (since 2007); and Director, Eubios Ethics Institute, (New Zealand; Thailand and Japan (since he founded it in 1990, www.eubios.info). Dr. Macer is also Director of the International Peace and Development Ethics Centre and Peace Park at Kaeng Krachan, and a Research Fellow at the Center for Ethics of Science and Technology, Chulalongkorn University, Thailand. Dr. Macer is also the Secretary of the Asian Bioethics Association.

Born in 1962 in Christchurch, New Zealand, he has a B.Sc (Hons) in Biochemistry from Lincoln College, University of Canterbury, 1983; Ph.D. in Biochemistry at the MRC Laboratory of Molecular Biology, and Trinity College, University of Cambridge, U.K., 1987; and was awarded an Honorary Doctorate in Philosophy from Kumamoto University, Japan in 2009. He has since worked in UK, New Zealand, Italy, Japan, Thailand and USA; and is a member of many international bioethics committees.


#### **Debidatta Mahapatra**

He has also published more than dozen articles on Jain history and demography, Jain society, and Jainism in USA. His first publication in 1971 was on Jain history. He has investigated the legendary Jain temple of Gori, Pakistan and the wooden Jain temple at the 1904 St. Louis word fair.

He served as the General Chair for Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) Symposium on Software Reliability Engineering, Denver, 2003, IEEE Asian Test Symposium, Shanghai, 1999, Int. Conf. on VLSI Design, Bombay, India, 1993, IEEE Int. Symposium on Microarchitecture, Albuquerque, 1991 etc. He edited "Software Reliability Models, Theoretical Developments, Evaluation and Applications" and "Bridging Faults and IDDQ Testing" published by IEEE Computer Society. He has served as an ABET commissioner and as a volunteer for IEEECS is several capacities. He has received the IEEE Third Millennium Medal, 2000 and IEEE CS Golden Core Award, June 1996.

Dr. Malaiya has been an invited speaker and panelist at the biennial JAINA (Jain Associations of North America) Conventions for many of the conventions and other forums in the US. He has been the coordinator for office of Alumni Affairs for ISSJS (International Summer School for Jain Studies) he has also been an invited speaker at other Jain forums.

He was the founder of the India Association of Northern Colorado and has served as its elected President for multiple terms. He was the creator of the very first website on Hindi language, and the first major web-site on Jainism. He is the moderator of an internet forum on Indian Archaeology.

#### **Darshan Mehta**



Darshan Mehta is Medical Director and Director of Medical Education for the Benson-Henry Institute for Mind Body Medicine at Massachusetts General Hospital (BHI-MGH) and Director of Education at the Osher Center for Integrative Medicine, Harvard Medical School and Brigham and Women's Hospital. He is an Assistant Professor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School

Dr. Mehta received his BA in Biology from Illinois Wesleyan University and an MD from University of Texas-Southwestern Medical School. He completed his residency

in internal medicine at University of Illinois-Chicago Hospital. In 2008, he completed a clinical research fellowship in complementary and integrative medicine at the Harvard Medical School Osher Research Center, during which he received a Master of Public Health degree from the Harvard School of Public Health.

His educational and research interests include curricular development in complementary and integrative medical therapies, mind/body educational interventions in health professions training, and promotion of professionalism in medical trainees. He directs medical student and resident rotational electives at BHI-MGH and the Osher Center. #### Joan Policastri


